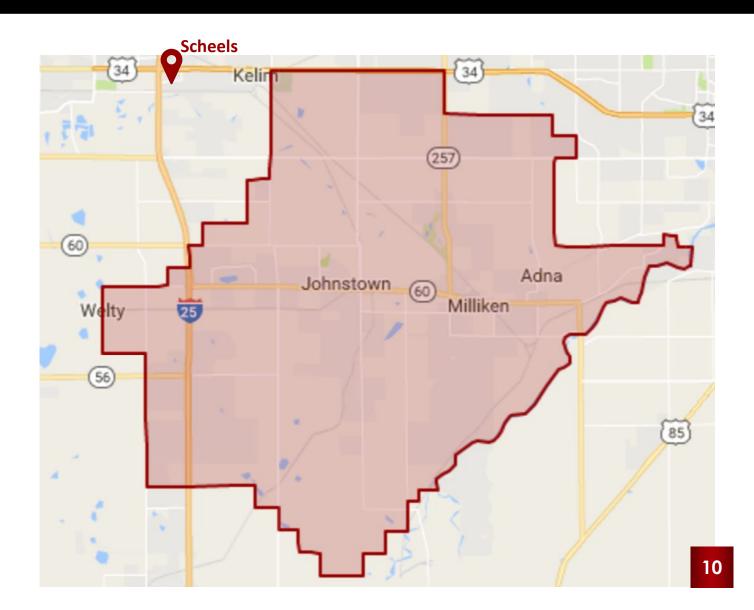




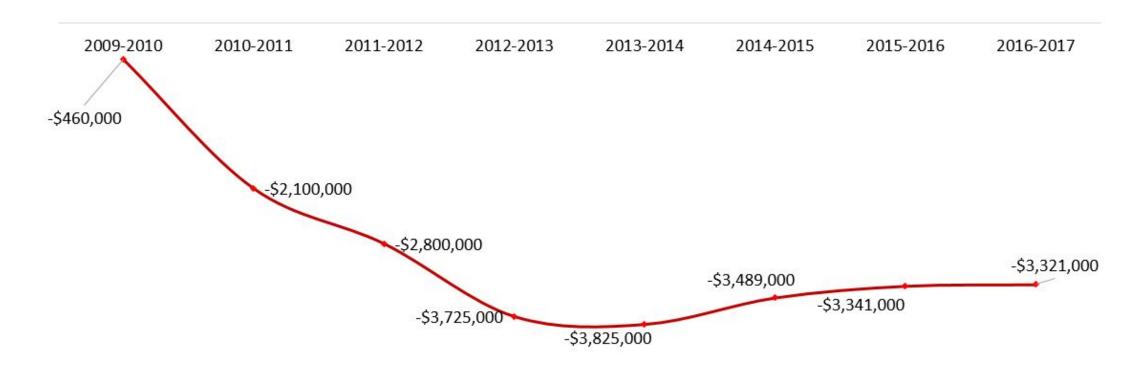
In 2016-2017, Weld RE-5J served 9% of the 42,872 students in Weld County.



Johnstown Plaza, an 80-acre project that includes the Scheels store and 900,000 square feet of retail space is located in neighboring Thompson School District.



- Since 2009-2010, Weld RE-5J has lost a combined total of \$23 million to Colorado's budget-balancing tool, the budget stabilization factor, formerly the negative factor.
- The \$3.3 million we lost this year alone, could have paid for an additional 48 teachers.*
- By 2017-2018 the combined estimated amount the district will have lost to the negative factor (\$26.8 million) is almost enough to construct a new elementary school.





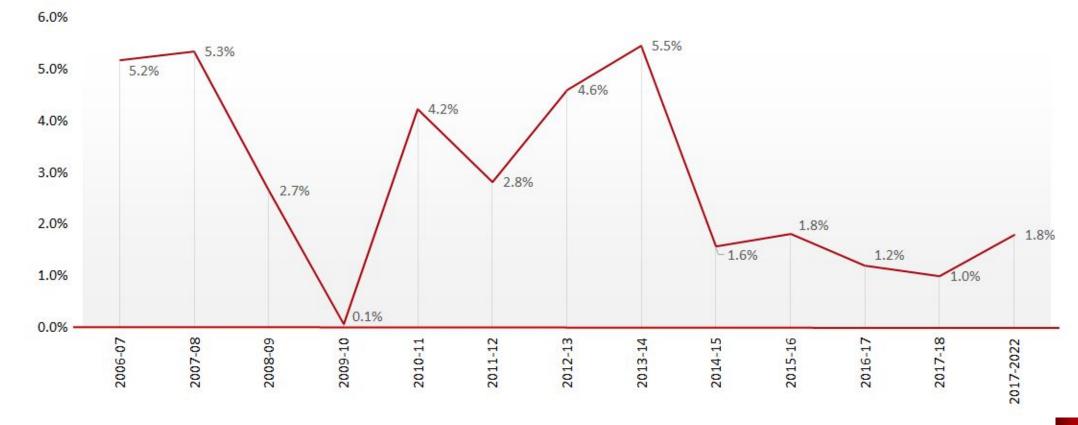


In 2017-18, Weld RE-5J is serving 3,870 students in 6 schools.

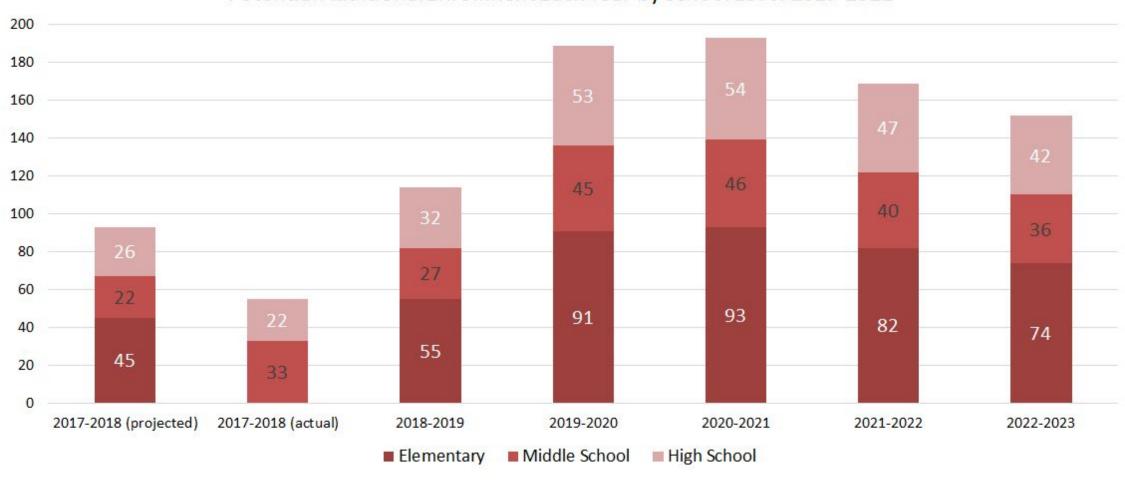

ANNUAL ENROLLMENT CHANGE FROM PRIOR YEAR

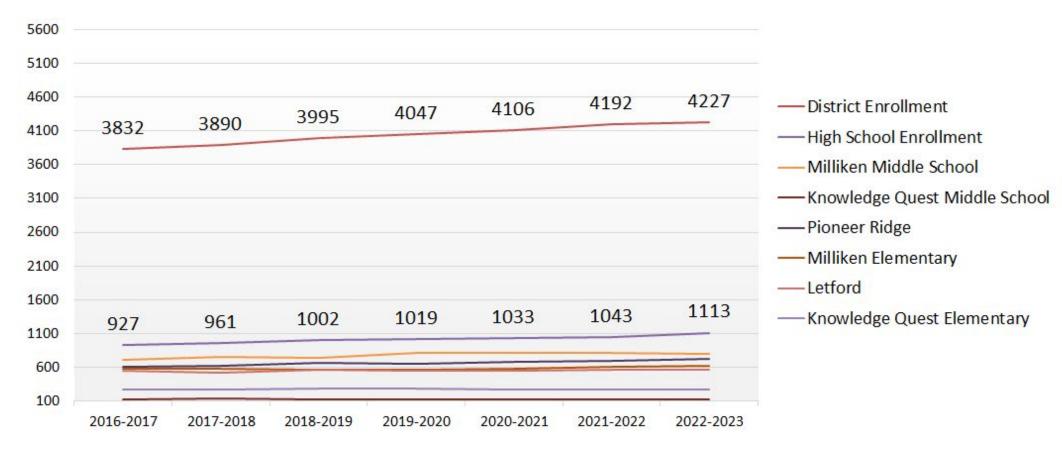




Potential Additional Enrollment Each Year by School Level 2017-2022*

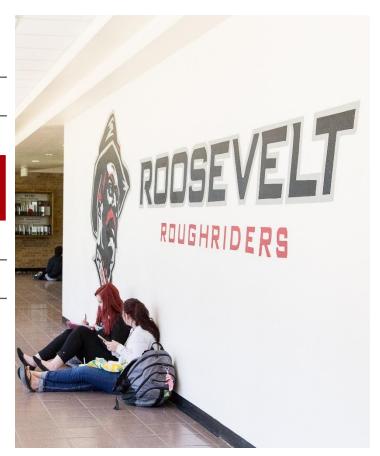

According to the Colorado School Finance Project, last November, voters in 21 school districts in our state approved over \$3.2 billion in bond issues to build new schools and expand and improve others.

WELD RE-5J SCHOOL DISTRICT MILL LEVY OVERRIDE (MLO)

Monies from a MLO are used for operating expenses not for major repairs and renovations to existing school buildings, additions to schools or new school buildings.

Examples of possible uses for MLO funding in Weld RE-5J:

- Operations/staffing for new high school*
- Safety and security enhancements
- Class size relief districtwide
- Technology and curricular resource that enhance learning (e.g., Stem Smart Labs)
- Enhanced counseling services (elementary, college and career, etc)

- Full-day kindergarten*
- Enhanced intervention programs (e.g., reading teachers, ESL, special needs teachers)
- Increased secondary elective options
- Increased concurrent enrollment and advanced placement options
- Enhanced districtwide gifted programming
- Enhanced 21st Century Learning skills

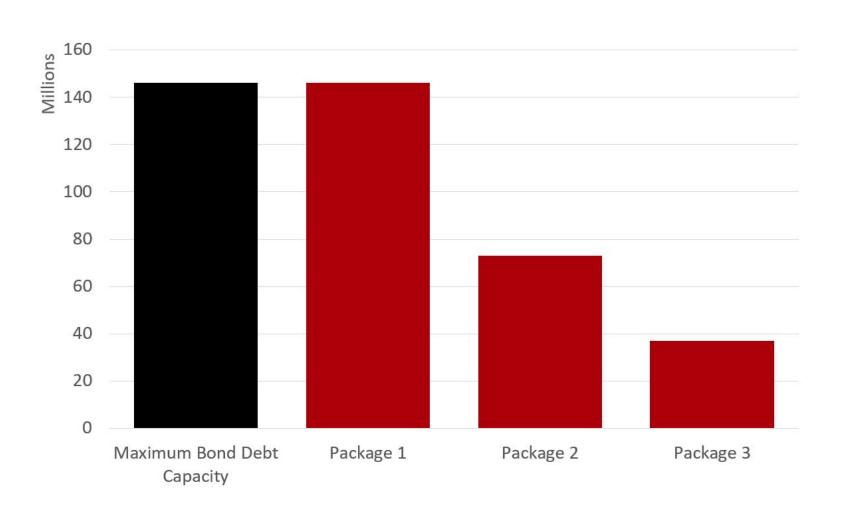

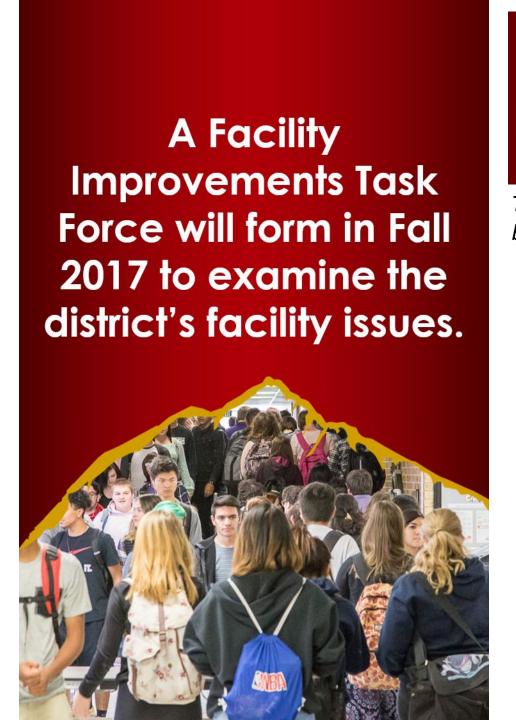

- The BOE will determine the scope of work that will be undertaken.
- Facility Improvements Task Force members will commit to becoming informed on the district's facility issues and hearing presentations from district committees, architects and other experts, teachers, students, leaders etc.
- They will provide input and recommendations related to potential project "packages" that the Board of Education will consider referring to voters in November 2018.

- Parents will receive email notification with a link to application
- Community will be notified via Johnstown Breeze and Facebook
- Online application can be completed at the Weld RE-5J district office for those without computer or internet access
- Applicants will receive notification on November 17

- Makes recommendations to the Board of Education concerning student and community growth and the related impact on district facilities and budget.
- Studies the district-wide programmatic implications of potential bond and mill levy override project packages.
- Monitors school and district achievement.
