Emergency Broadband Benefit Program

could help your household pay for

internet service during the pandemic

What is it?

The Emergency Broadband Benefit (EBB) Program was created by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) to help households struggling to pay for internet service during the COVID-19 pandemic. The benefit will provide the following discounts:

- Up to \$50 per month for broadband service for eligible households
- Up to \$75 per month for households on Tribal lands
- A one-time discount of up to \$100 to purchase a single laptop, desktop computer or tablet

Who is

eligible?

Your household is eligible if you or another member of the household meet at least one of the criteria below:

- Qualifies for the FCC's existing Lifeline program
- Receives benefits under a free and reduced-price school lunch program or school breakfast program
- Lost employment or experienced a substantial loss of income since Feb. 29, 2020
- Is a student who receives a Federal Pell Grant
- Meets the eligibility criteria for your participating internet provider's existing low-income or COVID-19 program
