Weld Trust Grant

In August, Roosevelt High School was awarded another \$25,000 from the Weld Trust. The money has gone toward two Career & Technical Education (CTE) Options: the Health Science Pathway and the CDIP Independent Study Pilot Course: Microsoft Office. Grants and partnerships enable Weld RE-5J School District to provide outstanding opportunities for our students on budget.

On top of standard police training, SRO's undergo specialized training to work with school staff and students for the purpose of creating safe learning environments, responding to all-hazard threats that may impact schools, and supporting students in need through positive interactions.

Weld RE-5J is recognizing their SRO's, Thomas Kelley and Jason Tope, for their service and commitment to the district. The Board recognized Officer Tope for his seven years of service at the October 5 board meeting. Milliken Middle School principal, Aspen Sanders, said of Officer Tope, *"He's an asset to our campus in ensuring our building is safe and secure. He's phenomenal with building relationships with kids and even provides educational talks about various topics in their areas of expertise."* Upon receiving his recognition, Officer Tope commented on how much he is really enjoying this stage of his career working with the schools and his interactions with the kids.

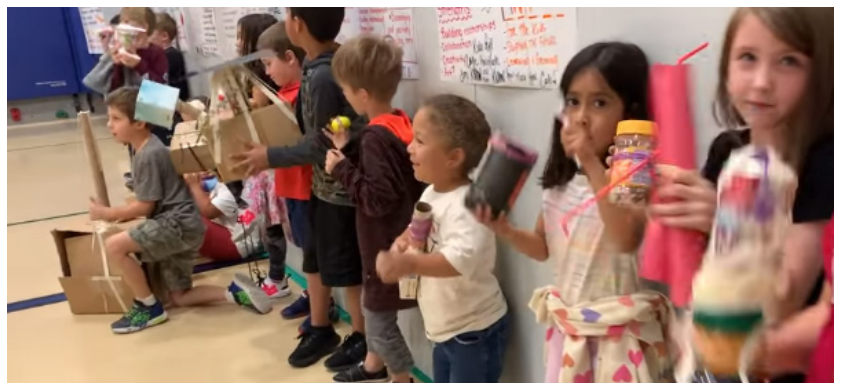
ELWELL ELEMENTARY RIBBON CUTTING CEREMONY

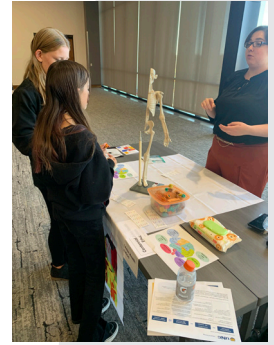
FFA Find Success at the Weld County and State Fairs

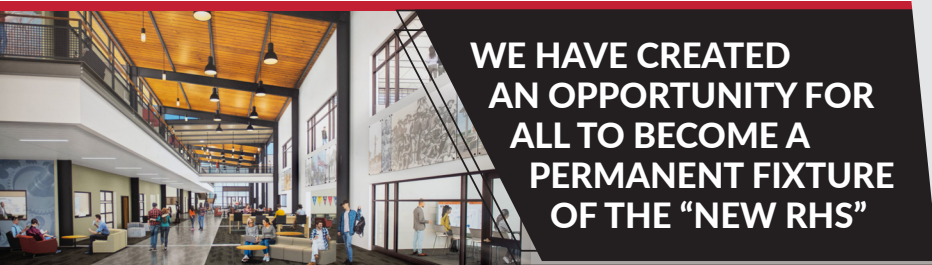


RHS Catering Serves Local Foundation
